Positive, proactive and timely support for secondary school improvement

Hampshire has a significant school improvement service – Hampshire Inspection and Advisory Service (HIAS) – with a proven track record in working effectively with schools to secure better outcomes for children and young people. A number of the HIAS team are also members of the Association of Education Advisers (AoEA). <u>Association of Education Advisers | Home (aoea.co.uk)</u>

Working closely with all Hampshire schools, HIAS recognises the many challenges and risks faced by secondary schools and their leaders including the changing curriculum, reviewed progress and attainment measures, recruitment and retention issues, the changing social and emotional needs of pupils, and the revisions to the Ofsted framework.

We use this knowledge and our close relationships to ensure that our work is relevant and responsive, but also professionally challenging.

Who is in the Secondary Team?

Our team includes current County School Improvement Managers (SIMs), and General Inspectors/Advisers who between them can work with schools on: English; mathematics; science; computing; history; geography; art; religious education (RE); modern foreign languages (MFL); design and technology (D&T); music; physical education (PE); all aspects of personal development; personal, social, health and economic education (PSHE); data and curriculum; improving outcomes for vulnerable pupils; special educational needs (SEN); safeguarding; finance; and middle and senior leadership development. Our team includes those who were formerly secondary headteachers, and senior leaders. Where a subject is not covered from within the team, SIMs can broker support and set up links to ensure the full range of identified needs can be met.

The team is supported by Tania Harding, Kate Broadribb, Mark Kingswood as School Improvement Managers (secondary) with Beverley Murtagh and the wider secondary inspectors/advisers holding subject roles.

This team offers support and challenge in addressing a number of key, core areas that must be in place to ensure that schools are healthy and strategic in their work.

What are the core principles of our work?

Our work with schools is based on the premise that effective school improvement is founded upon a shared understanding of what needs to be developed and why. At the heart of this lies the process of school self-evaluation and the constant questioning of leaders and the way in which they therefore engage "external eyes". We understand that the skill of school improvement lies with the fact that it is context specific. There is no "one size fits all" approach; no neat checklist. In understanding the context and working through and developing the most appropriate strategy for the school, positive change is supported.

We are strongly committed to the core principles that unpin the work with our secondary schools and ensure that those working together are well briefed, liaise closely with each other and with school leaders, and offer a professional, challenging and responsive approach. We have high expectations of ourselves.

A belief that every member of the HIAS workforce can and will develop the knowledge, skills, qualities and understanding to work effectively and in successful professional partnership with leaders, teachers and others in secondary schools.

Resilience and sustainability

A conviction that effective professional services for secondary schools cannot exist in isolation, require a pervasive culture of scholarship underpinned by a track record of robust evidence and expertise, and must seek out, harness and develop talent within services and schools.

Diversity and skills

A strong respect for the diversity and breadth of expertise, the skills, the specialist and general knowledge of individual members of both the HIAS and wider school workforces, and the collective power of that knowledge and experience.

Professionalism

The provision of robust and clearly understood operating procedures and systems which enable effective, collaborative and timely action and ensure that all professionals are held to account.

What bespoke support can we provide for your school?

Working with many schools both within and external to Hampshire, we have successfully delivered a number of bespoke programmes. All of our work links to current research and key thinking, as well as to the most recent Ofsted guidance and framework, with reference to schools' experiences.

As well as reviewing the curriculum mapping at Key Stages 3 and 4, and aligning the whole school assessment approaches, the bespoke support to schools has included:

Whole school self-evaluation and quality assurance:	We will deliver a bespoke two-day schedule to evaluate the quality of learning, the impact of the school's work and leadership, and a rigorous evaluation of whole school effectiveness, identifying critical actions for improvement, and leaving you with a summary report and outline actions
Whole school teaching and learning development:	Through a strategic whole school development programme, we will work with your school's teaching and learning lead to support your development of a clearly defined and robust improving teaching programme, guiding and coaching specific staff and placing high-quality teaching at the centre of your school's focus
Whole school action planning: Does your school improvement plan have impact?	Does it succinctly and sharply identify the key strategies required to secure improvement? Does it enable you to lead your staff in the core priorities and your governing body to undertake their role? Are you clear how to clarify the success criteria and milestones? We can provide support with this.
Curriculum area reviews and structured subject improvement planning:	A bespoke evaluation of specific subject and/or a department's health can support a revised approach to improvement of a subject, including a focus on the quality of teaching, the organisation of the curriculum and aspects of its leadership and management
Data management advice and structuring:	We can support your school in reviewing the use of data to include its collection and subsequent analysis, supporting both the awareness of progress and attainment in subjects but also of all pupil groups, towards setting meaningful targets
Pupil Progress Review Meetings (PPRM) with impact:	It is critical to ensure that PPRMs are robust, involve key pupils and key staff and lead to a revised approach in working with pupils, in order to close progress gaps. Evaluating your safeguarding culture and practices	HIAS can support your safeguarding evaluation in respect of the culture of your school and the processes you have in place; we will draw from statutory documentation and guidance, as well as provide advice around good practice

Advising on affordable staffing structures:	Budget challenges placed alongside curriculum requirements can create considerable tension in schools, in a particularly complex field. We can ensure current curriculum thinking shapes our discussions with you, link you to strong practitioners and those who have made similar adjustments, as well as work alongside our finance team to provide relevant benchmarking information. What subject networks are planned to meet your school's current needs?

We have strengthened our provision of subject network meetings providing school-based colleagues with the opportunity to share good practice, consider the work of others and to 'catch up' around their subject and with other local leaders. Keeping abreast of current professional development, national and local good practice, and adjustments to assessment practices have all required shared thinking and collaboration, aligned to the national agenda and also cognisant of DfEs advice.

HIAS has a breadth of subject networks to support most areas. There are both formal professional networks meetings, and informal 'staff meeting' sessions, which complement each other.

The sessions are planned to be a balance of virtual and face to face meetings as appropriate, enabling strong participation of as many of you as possible.

Secondary Performance and Progress Group (PAPG) led by the Secondary Strategy Team

The Secondary Performance and Progress Group (PAPG) is a very well attended network meeting that meets twice a year for a comprehensive updates and discussion on matters of mutual interest to secondary school headteachers and senior leaders, particularly concerning improving outcomes, performance data and the curriculum.

A standing feature of this meeting is to share crucial updates including changes to national policy, Department for Education (DfE) performance indicators, and Ofsted frameworks. It is also a forum through which changes in outcomes to performance indicators both locally and nationally are shared, and implications evaluated. They incorporate academic, attendance, exclusions and destinations data. Regular discussion around how schools are setting targets and measuring progress features, and best practice around *life without levels*, in particular, in terms of making the very best of key stage three for all pupils. The improvement in outcomes for ALL pupils, in particular those in key vulnerable groups are a theme that run through all discussions, and the sharing of best practice by schools is on the agenda of each meeting. Meetings are led by HIAS data and curriculum leads and also draw upon HIAS teaching and learning and subject expertise.

Recent meetings have focused on the needs of and accelerating the progress for disadvantaged pupils and those with SEND, as well as the challenges of the interim arrangements for assessment and examinations. At each meeting senior leaders contribute through presentations of their work – **this is strong networking at its best**.

All senior leaders are welcome to attend PAPG and contribute to the forum.

As in 2022-23, we have once again standardised these networks to enhance the quality of our offer and simplify planning, budgeting and logistics for schools. We would encourage schools to utilise our online booking form to register staff in the summer term for all 2023-24 subject networks. This will ensure that session dates are confirmed in staff diaries at the beginning of the academic year.

The offer

- Networks are offered half termly for mathematics and science, and termly for most other subjects.
- There are standard costs for all networks, depending on whether sessions are virtual (via Microsoft Teams), or venue based (venue based sessions include refreshments).
- Most subjects have a blended offer over the academic year, with a mixture of face to face and online training sessions.
- Sessions are scheduled in the afternoons and are 2.5-3 hours in duration.
- All network sessions will include standard agenda items.
- * New this year Whole School Literacy network. This is an opportunity for literacy leaders to collaborate and share best practice. Each session will include a CPD element that can be used to support development of literacy across the curriculum back in schools.
- * Please note that secondary photography networks will remain as a multisession offer for 23-24 (see below).

The primary aims of the subject network meetings are to, within the context of creativity, innovation and challenge:

- Ensure a clear understanding of the national picture and its application in local and school contexts.
- Support effective subject leadership as appropriate to each school's individual context.
- Develop skills and expertise and capacity within school subject leaders and their teams through quality strategic CPD and the sharing of good practice.
- Deepen understanding of subject specific pedagogy and knowledge that underpins good progress and attainment for ALL pupils.
- Facilitate school to school networking and develop strength across the system.

Common agenda items for these meetings:

- Development of subject specific knowledge and an understanding of strong progression and sequencing.
- Enhancing subject leadership.
- Structuring key stage 4 to ensure pupils are well prepared for the next phase of their education.
- Providing high quality key stage 3 provision that builds successfully on key stage 2.
- Ensuring all pupils, including the most vulnerable (SEN and PP) are able to make excellent progress.
- Sharing good practice and work.

Project work and other CPD opportunities and networks will continue and will evolve in line with need.

How to book

- For Hampshire maintained schools, please supply personnel numbers for delegates on the form.
- If you are a Hampshire academy, you will need to provide a Learning Zone EXT number for each staff member you wish to book on a network. Please ensure that Learning Zone accounts have been set up for all staff before completing the form. To create a new account, the user will need your school's Registration Code, Organisational ID and Customer Number in order to do this. If you do not have this information, please contact <u>htlc.courses@hants.gov.uk</u>.
- On sending the form, you will receive a message to confirm that your response has been submitted.
- Our course administrators will then make the Learning Zone bookings on your behalf.
- Automated Learning Zone booking notifications and Outlook diary invites for network sessions will be sent out to correspondence email address recorded

in ESS (for Hampshire schools)* or Learning Zone account email address (for Hampshire academies and external schools).

*We would like to remind Hampshire maintained schools that, if a user has omitted to register a **correspondence email address** in ESS Lite, no Learning Zone or IBC notifications can be sent to this individual. Email addresses can be checked by logging in to ESS Lite and ensuring that both the personal email and correspondence email address fields have been completed. The correspondence email is the one used for all Learning Zone booking notifications and joining information.

• The booking form will be closed at the beginning of the Autumn term once network sessions have started. If you wish to book sessions after this time, you will still be able to do this via the Learning Zone in the usual way.
